#### 1. Course Description

Students are expected to have a polished version of your thesis before the presentation. Students are also expected to not only prepare their own presentations diligently, but also take an active role in evaluating their fellow students.

**Presentation Time Slots** —Please work with TA to pick your time slot (Appendix A) before **6:00pm**, **April 16 (Monday)** based on "first come; first served" principle.

#### Communication —

#### 2.2 Course specific objectives

This course aims to prepare students to present their theses in an effective and efficient manner, and improve their professionalism for future positions in the business and/or academic fields.

#### 2.3 Assessment/Grading Details

The final grade will be determined based on the following three aspects:

The final grade of each student will be in the form of one of the following 4 scores: High Pass (HP, 90 and above), Medium Pass (MP, 80 to 89), Low Pass (70 to 79), and Fail (F, 69 and below). In the following a detailed description of each grade component is provided.

#### A. Attendance

Each student is required to attend two grand sessions and other sessions (Please refer to Appendix A). You are very welcome to attend other presentations.

Please check your attendance before your required sessions.

Students lose 0.5% point for every late arrival. An unexcused absence will result in the loss of all 10% attendance points. A second unexcused absence will result in a fail. Documentable health issues or interviews are excusable and should be pre-approved by the Professor. Early flights home, visits from relatives etc are not excusable.

Missing your presentation for any reason will result in your failing the course. There will no makeup presentation. You should plan your date carefully.

#### \*Note: The MA office may randomly check your attendance.

#### **B.** Presentation (70%)

<u>Submission of the slides.</u> Please refer to Appendix A for submission due time. The submissions after the due time will be penalized 5% of the total final grade for each 24-hour late.

<u>Upload of the slides.</u> Slides must be uploaded prior to your presentation. Any installation delay will be counted toward your allocated time.

<u>Presentation and Q&As.</u> Each student will present for 15 minutes plus 5 minutes for the feedback from the instructor and Q&As.

Slides. On your slide, please provide **your name and presentation timeslot.** 

Evaluation. The professor will evaluate your presentation based on presentation evaluation criteria (Appendix B)

#### C. Peer evaluation (20%)

Each student will evaluate other **three** students' presentation performance in the required session and submit the evaluation form before or in the last grand session on May 10 2018 (Peer evaluation form is Appendix B.) The three students are on your own choice. 20% of each student' final grade is based on the average peer evaluation scores of your fellow students.

If you submit peer evaluation forms after the due time, you will be penalized 5% of the total final grade for each 24-hour late.

#### 2.4 Academic Honesty and Plagiarism

Please refer to Handbook for PHBS students. It is important for a student's effort and credit to be recognized through class assessment. Credits earned for a student work due to efforts done by others are clearly unfair.
