1. Course Description

1.1 Context

Course overview: Macroeconomics is concerned with the behavior of the aggregate economy. This course is structured to provide a rigorous introduction to the study of macroeconomics. In this course we will be examining macroeconomic data and studying economic models designed to help us understand those data.

Prerequisites: Familiarity with intermediate level macroeconomics and econometrics (for example, textbooks such as "Intermediate Macroeconomics" by Mankiw and "Introductory Econometrics" by Wooldridge)
